TOP FIVE REASONS TO BE SURE YOU QUALIFY FOR THE NORTH AMERICAN PAIRS DISTRICT FINALS

#5-You can win red points in qualifying club games.

#4-You can earn a Red or a Blue Ribbon Qualification by winning the district finals in your flight.

#3-You can win red AND GOLD points at the district finals.

#2-You can win double digit point awards by winning the district finals.*

#1-You will earn a financial subsidy to attend the National Finals of the event.**

To be sure you know which flight is yours, think or look back to your May 6th computer cycle (the points that showed up on the back of your June ACBL Bulletin). If you were a Non-Life Master with fewer than 500 masterpoints at that time, you can play in Flight C. If you had fewer than 2500 masterpoints at that time, then you can play in Flight B. All others are in Flight A.

Are you curious what happens after you qualify in a club game in June, July or August? You win the honor of playing in the district-wide finals on Saturday and possibly Sunday, October 29th and 30th. As we go to press, it hasn't been decided yet whether this will be a standard finals

event, or an Electronic Devices Only event. Don't worry, we'll tell you all about it, as soon as we know the details for sure. If you are curious, before you receive the Sept/Oct Sunshine Bridge News, check back at District9ACBL.org and we'll publish updates.

One last note: you are expected to be a resident of District 9 on June 1st, in order to be eligible to play in the District 9 NAP Finals. If you have any questions about your eligibility, start by reading the Conditions of Contest posted at ACBL.org. Two full pages address how to determine if you are eligible to play in the district you wish. Then continue by verifying your eligibility by writing to NAP Chair Shirley Seals at ShirleySealsFL@aol. com.

*Awards depend on several things, which are based on the number of pairs who enter the event. The winners of Flight C might win 10 or 12.50 or even 15 masterpoints (25% gold). The winners of Flight B might win 16 or 20 or 24 masterpoints, all gold. The winners of Flight A might win 24, 30 or 36 masterpoints, all gold.

**The Finals are scheduled for March of 2017 at the Kansas City Spring NABCs.

CONGRATULATIONS TO OUR HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL BRIDGE CLUBS

As you probably recall, District 9 is the home of a vast number of tables of club bridge throughout the year. In 2013, 13 of the top 50 brick-and-mortar clubs, by table count, were in Florida. In 2014, 14 of the top 50 were in Florida. In 2015? This time, ACBL only published the top 25 clubs by table count, in the Bridge Bulletin, rather than the top 50. Florida had nine of the top 25. However, being the inquiring minds that we are, your editorial board wanted to compare apples to apples, rather than apples to...half an apple, or to anything else, for that matter.

But how to do that? Some of you might know the answer, but we had to go to a trusted source at ACBL in Horn Lake to find out. There's a place at the ACBL web site that publishes table counts of clubs! It's very similar to the place that shows masterpoint races. If you're curious, it's at https://web3.acbl.org/club-table-count/ and that address takes you to the current year. Who knew you could check to see how your own club is doing this year? Then you can reset the year to find info from previous years. You can do it by unit, by district, or by all ACBL.

Back to the original question. In 2015, how many Florida clubs were in the top 50 in table count? Twelve. Eleven of them were in the top 50 in 2014, as well. Special congratulations to Temple Sinai DBC in Delray Beach for finishing 32nd of all ACBL clubs in '15, making it into the

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

It has been almost three years since I "threw my hat in the ring" for the ACBL District Director from Florida. It has been an enormous privilege to work alongside so many talented and dedicated volunteers. Thanks to your support and confidence, I have had the opportunity to promote bridge both here in Florida and across North America. The goal has always been: More Players, More Play, Better Bridge (borrowing from TheCommonGame motto).

How have we done?

Year One: It was a bumpy road to say the least. There is a lot to learn about the complex internal mechanisms of the organization and the politics of ACBL governance. Florida's 19,760 average membership is almost 12% of the ACBL membership but we only have 4% of the vote. Hence, over 13,000 of our members have no voice. In District 15 (the smallest district) each member has 6x the voting power as a Florida member. These inequities coupled with partisan politics and distractions of the annual ritual of electing a Board President leave the average viewer rightfully befuddled as to how the Board could ever "do the right thing" or "do what's best for bridge."

Year Two: We were buffeted by huge write-offs, impairment of assets, severe strain on our aging infrastructure, and fragility of

our beloved ACBLScore. We continued to re-arrange the proverbial deck chairs.

Year Three: Where are we now? ACBL membership has not grown significantly and the average age continues to increase ominously. We are financially less secure. Our TD ranks continue to lose significant talent. Member confidence has eroded due to our responses to three big challenges we currently face: Cheating, Technology and Financials.

However, there is real reason for hope:

We have acknowledged these realities and have committed to a strategic direction with action plans that address these issues. The risks are real. We must stay focused on the strategic priorities and not allow politics to distract us from our mission. We desperately need a new governance model that allows all members to be represented equally and that frees the Board to focus on what is best for the future of bridge, not just what is currently important in a particular geographic area.

I apologize for the "heaviness" of this message but I felt it was time for a self-assessment. You be the judge now and let me know how you feel.

What?! Were They Thinking...

So you just finished playing 27 boards and you're wishing you could have done better. Ever wonder how the pros would have played those hands? What line would they have taken to make that 3NT or how they would have bid that 6-5-1-1 hand? Well wonder no more. Just come *Kibitz the Pros*.

Kibitz the Pros is a new feature of The Common Game that allows you to hear the thinking of bridge professionals as they play Common Game hands. Each of the four pros is streamed (live feed) and recorded as they speak their thought process... what they are doing and why... as they play the hands. Players can watch the pros live or can watch the recorded videos on YouTube. "What a fantastic new venture! Imagine being able to get inside

the mind of an expert bridge player (in real time), and get feedback on each hand during the bidding and play. This is better than hiring a pro," says Champion player and *Kibitz* commentator Drew Cannell.

A team of National, International and Junior champions has volunteered their time to play Common Game hands and to provide us with the rare opportunity to get inside their heads and learn how they think. Another Champion player and *Kibitz* commentator, Daniel Korbel, says, "One of the most difficult things about bridge is that you have to learn a certain way of thinking about the game, and this is really hard to teach. Watching along with experts is an amazing way to absorb some of the thinking patterns by osmosis."

Kibitz is a unique and fun way to learn

how to think about a bridge hand from every angle, by watching and listening to the experts as they "think out loud." You will learn how they decide what lines to take on their defense and declarer play. You will learn how they think about the bidding, what each bid means and what inferences you can take from the bid; the importance of carding and how partnerships convey information about their hands; the importance of paying attention to everything that is going on and how to think about the distributions, both points and suit cards, around the table. For example, when multiple-NABC winner Sylvia Shi was dealt a hand with 6-5 in the minors (we've all been there) she had to decide how to bid over a 1NT opening by the opponents. She explained, "I have a few options here.... If I wanted to show the minors I would be bidding 2NT... actually I am going to do something a little unusual...I'm just going to bid 3 diamonds. The reason I am going to hide my club suit is that my diamonds are so good that even if we do have a club fit it will be ok if we play in diamonds. This way I keep a little something in reserve if the opponents end up playing the hand... I will have a little bit of a surprise for them." (5/17, Bd #8)

In another game, when talking about carding in response to his partner's 2 of diamonds lead, Daniel Korbel explained, "I don't know if I can afford to waste the Q. If that's a singleton I don't want to play the Q and help declarer set up his ten. If I thought [my partner] had three diamonds I would definitely play the Q because now I can make it crystal clear to him that I have the QJ and he can continue the suit." This type of commentary on a hand - from four experts – is an extraordinary resource for players who want to improve their game.

"Kibitz the Pros allows viewers to glean trade secret gems. Experts have time to expand on concepts that are top of mind and draw parallels to other aspects of the game." Champion player Adam Grossack

If there is one continuous refrain heard from all of the experts, it is that players always need to pay attention... to the bids, the carding, the play... And players need to be thinking about distribution. Watching these videos will show you how these top players glean information about the hand and how they use that information to make assumptions and draw conclusions. As they are playing, you will often hear things like, "He raised to 3 hearts with sort of a marginal hand... it's funny that he did that with only 5 hearts so you wonder what his shape is. He maybe has shortness in spades. He may have a stiff spade. He probably has some diamond length behind me. That's why he's leading trump. Maybe he's 5-4-3-1 with 4 diamonds" (Adam Grossack) and, "So partner has ace of hearts, QTxxx of spades ... so that gives declarer 6 spades to the AK and 4 hearts, 2 diamonds and 1 club" (Champion player and long-time



Common Game Analyst Allan Graves) and "[My partner] has 3 hearts, declarer has 2, [my partner] has 4 spades, declarer has 5... so declarer looks to be 5-2-4-2. And it looks like he's going to need to ruff some diamonds. Hmmm. Should I go for the tap. No, I'm gonna go with stopping the ruffing of diamonds... cause I think that's what this hand is about." (World Champion David Berkowitz)

One of the most powerful aspects

of *Kibitz* is that players get to hear four perspectives on the same hand as each pro comments from their respective positions about what is going on and what they plan to do. Hearing all four perspectives provides very unique learning opportunity. "Comparing different perspectives on the same deal is very useful - a partnership could watch the defenders' live streams and see how each defender knows or can infer things about the full deal." (Oren Kriegel, Junior Champion). In addition, Common Game players will be able to see how an expert played their (the player's) hand no matter which seat they were in. What better way to learn than this?

Lest one thinks that Kibitz is all work and no play, all these pros have a great sense of humor and love to have fun while playing. "Another benefit is that I can critique my partner's play of the hand," says multiple-NABC winner Gary Cohler. "They are at my mercy. This can all be done in a humorous way,...from anywhere", namely, for Gary, the local cigar bar. David Berkowitz was heard to say, "At this pace I think we'll finish five hands at about 2 am, which is not bad because I am not teeing off until 10:00 tomorrow morning, in case anyone needs a tee time." And when gently teasing his partner about his lead, Allan Graves commented, "So my partner made an unusual lead, to tell the truth 'fourth from your longest and strongest' is so passé. So all of you out there except my partner would have beaten this hand but I still like him anyway." These guys and gals keep their viewers entertained.

In addition to learning and laughing with the pros, we also get to lose with them. Yes, they too occasionally overbid, make the wrong lead or misplay a hand. After going down on a hand, one expert player explained, "If I cash one spade I'm home. But I got ahead of myself and forgot what to do, which happens first board out of the slot." Another player made it clear he made a mistake, saying, "Oh my goodness gracious. I shouldn't have played a high spade at all." It is heartening to know that

they, like we, make mistakes. They just make fewer of them.

An exciting possibility for this type of learning is that Kibitz could "help introduce non-bridge players to the game and may help expose young people in particular to bridge." This new delivery mechanism may be the vehicle to show them how "interesting and challenging bridge is...overthrowing notions of bridge as an antiquated, old folks' game." Oren Kriegel. William Whipple, a non-bridge player who assists with the production of Kibitz the Pros, commented, "As a nonbridge player this streaming process has been very interesting. Seeing professionals talk through the hands and explain their thinking process has exponentially helped me understand bridge and specifically the bidding language. The pros are very talented and often surprise me with just how much they know about the cards in each individual's handI have started to enjoy watching these different personalities play the game. I believe this streaming/video logging has the potential to be huge in the community."

Where can this great experience be found? Lots of places. First, there is the website (www.kibitzthepros.org) where players can find links to all the videos that have been produced. There are also links to "Outtakes" of funny moments, "Best Learning Moments" and "Testimonials". The Common Game website (www. thecommongame.com) has a link to the videos on its home page banner.

Players can access the videos through the YouTube channel, *Kibitz the Pros*. And, on days that *Kibitz* games will be played, all Common Game players will receive an email with links to the live streams so they can watch these hands being played in real time. Common Game players will also be able to vote on which five hands (from the afternoon game) the experts will play.

Come and experience this new initiative of the Common Game. Come *Kibitz the Pros* and find out, "What?!... were they thinking?"

As my friend Marty Bergen says, he advises students to pray that reverses don't come up.

Basically, a "reverse" is when opener's rebid (2nd bid of the auction) meets both A & B: A) Opener's rebid is in a HIGHER ranking suit than his first suit

B) Opener's rebid is at a HIGHER level than responder's response

Just those two simple lines are enough to make many of my students' eyes glaze over.

So, these are reverses:

1 - 1 - 2 | 1 - 1 - 2 | 1 - 1 - 2 | 1 - 1 - 2 | 1 - 1 NT - 2 | 1 -

1♥-1NT-2♠

In all auctions above, the last bid is made by the opener, of course. Each bid is natural and promises extra values (approximately 16/17+). Reverses are forcing one round--the responder can not pass. However, reverses are not forcing to game. Opener's jumpshift (a different topic), is game forcing.

Contrast these two auctions:

1 **1 -** 1 **v** - 2 **♦** as opposed to 1 **•** - 1 **•** - 2 **v**.

On the first auction, opener (who jumped and changed suit) has to have 19+ -- his jumpshift is game forcing.

On the second auction, opener (who reversed) has to have 16/17+ -- his reverse shows extra values, is forcing one round, but not forcing to game.

All reverses should show unbalanced hands. With balanced hands, the opening is 1NT or 2NT, or the rebid is 1NT or 2NT. Reverses show that the first-bid suit is longer than the suit

reversed into. So, 1 - 1 - 2 would show not only 16/17+, but would indicate 5+ and 4.

After Opener's reverse:

As to the follow-ups, after, say 1♦-1♠-2♥, I recommend:

2 = 5 + spades, 1 - round force

2NT=Forcing, but could be weak (responder can pass opener's next bid). Denies 5+ ♠

3♣ = Natural. GF

3♦ = Natural, GF (some decent values)

3♥ = Natural, GF 4 hearts

3♠ = Natural, good suit, GF

3NT=Natural, some extras, but no real slam interest.

The generic summary of the above treatment would be as follows:

After opener's reverse, responder's repeat of his suit=5+, one-round force

2NT=Potentially a weak sign-off type of hand 3-level=values, GF

I don't advocate "reverses" after a 2/1 auction -- so there is no such thing as opener promising extras (1♥-2♣-2♠ can be bid with a dead minimum). I prefer to think of reverses only when the auction starts 1-1 (any 1 opening and any 1-level response, including 1NT).

Reverses after negative doubles are a tricky topic. For example, is this a reverse?

West North East South
- 1♣ 1♠ Dbl
Pass 2♠?

This, and other similar auctions have confounded bridge players and teachers for decades. If I had the perfect answer for you, I'd tell you--but I don't. My best suggestion is to consider these auctions as not promising extras. Certainly, if North's rebid was 2 (the suit that South surely has) it wouldn't be considered a reverse showing extras.

If you're a new player, be prepared to struggle with the concept of reverses. Consider them your enemy.

The Kibitzeris Shirley Wright

West led ◆4. Dummy played the ◆2, and East won the ◆K. East led the ◆4 to West's ◆J and West played the ◆A, ruffed with the ▼4. Declarer now led the ▼5 to the ▼10, ruffed dummy's last ◆ with the ▼A, and led the ▼K pulling the last trump from West.

All Pass

3♥

Declarer led the ♠7, West following with the ♠2, and the ♠Q lost to the ♠A. East returned a low spade and declarer won, in dummy, but had no choice but to take the losing diamond finesse for down 1, losing two black aces and two diamond tricks.

Solution

Bidding: The 4♥ raise by North was an overbid. The hand is too balanced and does not have enough cover cards. It has good defense against spades. I agree with East's pass of 4♥.

East has nice defensive values, and plenty of potential losers in a spade contract.

Play: East made a major error by playing the •K (denying the queen) at trick 1. Understandably, it fooled her partner. Instead of a routine set by winning the \(\bullet \quad \), returning a club, and getting another diamond lead, declarer can and should make the hand at this point. Note that if declarer had the \$J, it is doubly imperative that a second diamond is led before a second club is played. South played the hand well, until he played the ♠Q on the 7. In theory, West cannot gain by ducking the spade if she had the A, and could well lose a trick. West marks the \(\Q \) in the South hand, so the only remaining trick is a spade. And if West actually had the ◆Q, there is more urgency to take the ♠A. So declarer should place the ♠A with East, and needs two spade tricks to avoid the diamond finesse. Let us see what happens if declarer plays the \$\delta 5\$ instead of an honor. Now the ♠7 loses to the ♠10. East is completely endplayed: A club lets dummy ruff getting rid of one diamond, and the ruffing spade finesse gets rid of the other. A low spade return is better, but declarer can win the ♠9 in dummy with the ♠Q and play the ♠K, felling the last spade higher than the ♠8 (the ♠J). So if that happens, declarer makes 2 spades, 7 hearts and one diamond. Note that West erred by playing the ♠2 on the first spade, rather than the 9. The hand cannot be made had West done that. But West presumed declarer had the ◆Q so was probably conceding the contract.


North-South wound up with 3/8 (37% in the commongame). A score of +620 would have been a top (8/8), 92% in the common game. All players made errors.

Key lesson: Be careful about defensive falsecards, as they can fool your partner as well as declarer. Sometimes you don't care, but it should have proved critical on this hand.

Daisy's Political Venture

Daisy is my favorite bridge student/ partner. Through study and focus, her game has improved at an impressive rate. Notably, her performance at the table is remarkably upgraded when she imbibes a caffeinated beverage. Even her bridge-related questions are enhanced while indulging a coffeerelated drink. Daisy and I were eating lunch before today's game, accompanied by a bridge partnership comprised of two very outspoken women with wildly disparate political leanings. Farrah Wright is generally regarded as being more conservative than Prince von Metternich, while her regular companion at the bridge table, Ima Leftomarx, resides at the other end of the political spectrum. Remarkably, they often find themselves in the club overalls when playing together. Go figure.

Now that's an excellent query, the response to which will often determine the success or failure of declarer's goal. I was about to deliver my standard, if not somewhat haughty answer of, "Whenever there is absolutely, positively and unequivocally no reason not to do so." But before I could reply, Farrah leaned forward and almost pounded the table while speaking with resounding conviction, "Hopefully before the Republican Convention!" A moment later, Ima chimed in with similar intensity, "If not sooner!"

"Whoa," I mused to myself. These

women must be destined for a good game today as they certainly appear to be on the same page with regards to non-bridge-related matters. Just the same, I did not care to have Daisy distracted by matters that don't really pertain to our success at the bridge table. Making a mental note to address Daisy's excellent inquiry about when to draw trump, I hastily excused myself from the table and ushered Daisy to our assigned table.

As fate would have it, Daisy's first hand related to her earlier question regarding the issue of trump management. And there were other challenges to overcome in both the bidding and play. She quickly sorted the following hand:

- ♠ AKQJ109
- **y** 7
- ♦ QJ109
- **♣** A 7

As she reached for the bidding box in search of the 2& card, she was startled to find that her right-hand opponent had beaten her to the punch.


Yes, he had actually opened the bidding with an artificial and strong 2. bid, which placed her beautiful hand in a different light. While suspiciously eyeing her opponent, Daisy considered her options. It appeared that she could make nine tricks in a spade contract without even breathing hard and that game would roll home if dummy provided as much as a single trick. However, in light of her opponent's strong opening bid, the expectation of dummy providing anything of value seemed rather remote. As such, she chose to bid the contract that she believed she could make, placing the 3♠ card on the table with a sense of conviction. Daisy's left-hand opponent doubled, conventionally showing a weak hand, lacking either an ace or a king. Three passes followed and her LHO led the ▼10 against Daisy's contract of 3♠ doubled. This was the layout of the hand from Daisy's perspective in the South seat after the opening lead.

As I tabled my genuine yarborough (no card higher than a nine), I anticipated a distressed groan from Daisy. However, I was pleasantly encouraged when Daisy greeted the sight of dummy with a cheerful "Thank you, partner," then called for a small heart from the dummy. East overtook his partner's lead with the ♥J and continued with the ♥A at trick two, which Daisy ruffed with the ♠9. She quickly withdrew the ace of trump from her hand without facing it and held it in midair for several moments. While the opponents waited for her to display her card, Daisy abruptly returned the A to hand. She then reached for her ever-present Starbucks' container and took a hefty gulp. After a thoughtful pause, Daisy placed the ◆Q on the table.

When both West and dummy played low, East considered Daisy's card for quite some time before playing his •K. He thought for an even longer time about his next play. However, his pensive exercise was in vain, as there was no effective defense to Daisy's contract. The entire hand is in the next column.

Daisy's reluctant refusal to start drawing trump at trick three was crucial to her success. Had she immediately pulled all of the opponents' trump, she would have lost control of the hand when she eventually attempted to establish the two diamond winners that were necessary for her contract. (East would play a high heart, forcing Daisy to use her last trump. She would be unable to



establish any diamond winners since East would cash his remaining high hearts when he regained the lead with his •A). By leaving the vital •5 in the dummy, Daisy provided East a Hobson's choice of sorts upon winning his first diamond trick. Playing a high heart would allow Daisy to make an overtrick by ruffing it with dummy's lone trump while discarding her •10. East was therefore compelled to play one of the remaining three suits at trick four. This benefited Daisy as it provided her the opportunity to develop nine winners before being mortally tapped-out in the trump suit.

Accompanied by a dispirited growl, East eventually played a spade at trick four. Daisy hastily drew the remaining trump before playing on diamonds. In the end, Daisy won six spade tricks, two diamonds and the AA, for a total of nine tricks and the fulfillment of her doubled contract.

Daisy was almost panting with nervous excitement. "Whew, thank goodness we had our little discussion about when to... and when not to... pull trump!"

Extremely pleased with Daisy's exquisite performance on the previous hand, I eyed Daisy's cup of latte and thought to myself, "Yeah...and thank goodness for Starbucks."



- West led ♠A, ♠K and continued with a third spade. How would you continue? It looks right to ruff in the South hand and pitch a possible diamond loser from North. Now

if trumps split 3-2, there does not seem to be problem.

It looks like a diamond can be ruffed and suit set up. Declarer decided to draw two rounds of trumps ending in dummy with the K. Now he could have simply played a third trump and claimed. As long as diamonds split 3-1 or 4-0 in East hand, the diamond suit can either be set up with a ruff or finessed. However, declarer

left the third trump outstanding. Now, he led the •K. When West ruffed with his trump winner, and played a club, there was no way to take the diamond finesse or set up the suit and score a long winner.

There was almost no possible reason for this play. West could not really have a shape of 6-2-4-1, as the bidding and defense would have gone differently. So the only possible explanation is that declarer played too quickly and did not account for 4-0 diamonds with East having four.

In the other room N/S made +130 and with +50, FLEISHER won 5 imps. Had 4♥ made, the COREN team would have won 7 imps. The result of the match was 12 IMPs to FLEISHER. While there were many other key hands that could have swung the match, just a tiny bit more thought would save 12 here.

Play Hard Play Well

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Scoring All Your Trump

You reach a 6♥ contract without many values and with only an 8-card trump fit. Can you find a way to score 12 tricks?

Dummy hits and you see:

- **♦** AQT653
- **7**2
- A
- ♣ AK83
- **4**
- ♥ AQJT84
- ♦ J863
- ♣ J4

LHO leads the ♠9. Plan Your Play!

Trusting the ♠9 to not be from the ♠K, you decide to not take that finesse and win with the ♠A at trick 1.

Entries on this hand are the key. We could try to set up the ♠ suit, but if they are 4-2, that will take too many entries while also drawing trump. Instead, let's try to score 12 tricks with ♠AK, ♠A, ♠A, and 8♥ tricks. We do this by shortening our trump and setting up an endplay, which requires the ♥K to be onside!

Now, re-enter dummy and cash our winners.

- 3: •3 4 A 2 (+3)
- 4: **A**A 6 4 2 (+4)
- 5: **♣**K 7 J 5 (+5)

Continue shortening our trump.

Also score two trump tricks by ruffing in the dummy.

7: •6 •5 •2 •9 (+7) 8: •5 •J •T •7 (+8) 9: •8 •T •7 •Q (+9)

Shorten our trump one last time.

Now, exit with the losing \blacklozenge , leaving us with only $\blacktriangledown AQ$ – and let the opponents lead to us for the final two tricks, making $6\blacktriangledown$.

Notice that this line of play allowed us to score all 6 of our trump tricks in hand without spending any of dummy's trump to take a finesse. This is a powerful and useful line of play to have in your bag of tricks.

The complete deal was the following:

Avoiding Card Problems: Bidding and Playing

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"I saw that card, so you have to play it!"
That's a refrain I hear fairly often—and it ain't necessarily so. The standards are different for cards played by the defenders and the declarer.

- 1. If you are defending and you hold a card so that your partner could see it if he were looking, it's a played card. It doesn't matter if an opposing player saw it.
- 2. For the dummy, a card is played if declarer calls it or touches it.
- 3. If declarer says something non-specific like "play," the lowest card must be played.
- 4. If declarer says "play anything," either opponent may designate which card should be played.
- 5. Declarer's card is deemed to have been played when it is held face up touching or nearly touching the table. Again, it's irrelevant whether or not an opponent saw it.

In commenting on Law 45, Played Card, Duplicate Decisions advises directors that any disputed situation should be resolved in favor of the side which "didn't cause the problem." And these are easy problems to avoid, really. Just don't touch a card or call one until you are sure of what you want. Play only at your turn. We often see a declarer lead a card from his hand and call one from the dummy before the LHO has played. Whoops! Now declarer is stuck with the card he called, even though he has, say, under-trumped.

It's also rare that a Director would allow a declarer to change his call: the standard of "incontrovertibly obvious," not often achieved. You'll find an interesting discussion of this problem in the Rulings FAQ on the ACBL website: http://web2.acbl.org/documentLibrary/rulings/Changing-a-Called-Card-from-Dummy.pdf.

You are within your rights in requiring that Law 45 be enforced. Don't let an opponent pout and whine something like, "Well, if you want to win that way—" as if his error were your fault. Just call the Director and let us do our job.

Similar difficulties arise with handling the bidding boxes. If players just wouldn't fumble with the cards before they choose the one to put on the table, there would be many fewer director calls. Again, there's a Rulings FAQ on the subject, which concludes with

Note: Many players have learned to say "mechanical error" whenever the director is called. Directors should be wary of accepting this self-serving statement without acting with due diligence. We do not accept "mechanical error" when the first call is Pass and the second call is 3. We should also look askance at hands that hold two long suits where it is possible the bidder was thinking about his second bid while making his first. The onus here is on the player to prove it is indeed a mechanical error, not an error brought about through distractions, fatigue, or mental carelessness.

Of course, there will be genuine mechanical errors. When you have pulled

Preempts in the Majors Using Losing Trick Count

by Linda J. Green

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The losing trick count works well when we have ruffing potential, but when that does not exist, we use a better approach. Calculate partner's losers, deduct from 13, add on your winners. This gives you how many winners you can make in a hand.

Count losers by the number of aces, kings and queens missing in each suit. We only count the number of losers depending on the number of cards we hold in each suit.

A singleton ace = 0 losers.

AKxx = 1 loser Jxx = 3 losers AQxx = 1 loser Qx = 2 losers Kxxx = 2 losers x = 1 loser An unsupported Qxx = 3 losers QJx = 2 losers QJx = 2 losers QJx = 2 losers.

Using the LTC to preempt in a major

If your long suit is easy to determine, we then count "PLAYING TRICKS". Count 13 minus the number of losers.

e.g. $\spadesuit 3 \lor QJ109654 \bullet 9 \clubsuit J987$. With \lor s as the trump suit, we have the following losers: $1 \spadesuit + 2 \blacktriangledown + 1 \bullet + 3 \clubsuit = 7$ losers from 13 gives us 6 playing tricks. Open $3 \blacktriangledown$ and forget about points. When we preempt we use the Rule of 2 + 3, expecting to go down 2 vulnerable and 3 not vulnerable.

If you have a 7-card major suit with a side 4-card suit and a 6-loser hand open 4 of the major!

Use the LTC as your guideline as to whether to preempt in 1st and 2nd seat or not? Suit Quality is most important as the suits should have 2 of the top 3 honors, holding AK or KQ or AQ plus length.

Using the LTC for Weak Twos in a Major: in 1st or 2nd seat only

(Weak 2♦ openings, the LTC does not apply.)

When we open a Weak Two in a major, we either have an 8-loser or a 7-loser hand: no more than 8 losers, no less than 7 losers (too strong).

- A) ♠ AQ7653
 - 2/65*3*
- B) **♦** 43 **♥** KOJ843
 - **♥** 9 **♦** 542.

- ♦ K75
- ♣ 865 = 8 losers
- 4.32 = 7 losers

Responder requires ruffing potential or playing TRICKS.

Responder

- e.g. **★** 982
 - **9** 653
 - ♦ AK76
 - ♣ AK3

Should partner open 2♥, you have 4 playing tricks.

If opener has 8 losers, with example A:
Deduct 8 losers from 13 tricks = 5 playing tricks + our 4 tricks = 9 tricks = no game!
If opener has 7 losers, with example B:
Deduct 7 losers from 13 = 6 playing tricks +

Deduct 7 losers from 13 = 6 playing tricks + our 4 tricks = 10 tricks = game!

6/4 shapes might have 6 losers and are the same for weak jump overcalls. Too strong! Therefore, my suggestion is as follows:

If you have a feature (either an outside ace or king) do not show the opponents what you have, BID GAME!

If you have a singleton in the hand (you cannot have two outside features, only one or the other) rather show the singleton, so responder can see if the cards are working tricks.

Self Sufficient Suits

Count the number of cards in your long suit. Add the number of honors in that suit.

The total is the SUIT QUALITY! If the suit is a major, try to insist on it as the trump suit.

ANOTHER WINNER FIVE YEARS IN A ROW

In May/June, when we congratulated John Brady of Jacksonville for being the winner of more silver points in all of ACBL, five years in a row, we missed congratulating another five-time winner. Sanford Robbins of Pompano Beach has been beating out all the competition in the Helen Shanbrom Ace of Clubs races in his category, every year for the past five years. In 2011, Sanford won the 50-100 level ACBL-wide with 259.87 masterpoints earned in club games. In 2012, he won the 300-500 level with 316.50 points. In 2013, he won the 500-1000 category with 385.27 points. In 2014 and 2015,

Sanford won the 1000-2500 level, with 441.49 points and 488.69 points respectively.

When we realized our error in not taking notice of this phenomenal a c h i e v e m e n t, and had a great conversation with Sanford, here's

what he told us: "I would describe myself as at best an average plus player with excellent attendance. I play almost every day and most days twice. I've also been lucky to have very good players as partners."

We asked him where he plays and who his favorite partners are. Look at this impressive list: "I play mostly at the Pompano club and the Ft Lauderdale Bridge Club, and sometimes at the Greek Church in Boca and Jourdan's in Delray. When I started in the summer of 2010, I knew no one and now, believe it or not, I have over 125 partners. I play with Ed Rauch three times a week. M.L. Steuer twice a week, and when here in the winter Mark Savedoff twice a week. Many others like Tom Lane, Ken Wagner, Steve Hudson, Mickey Levensohn, Gina Lohmann, Lynda Patten, Jake Maranz, Keith Gellman, Betty Trilliegi play with me once a week. Others fill in when the others are not available." It's totally clear to us that Sanford most definitely is a great partner to have!

In the meantime, during those five years that Sanford was playing and scratching in all those clubs games, other players who live in the same southeast Florida bridge-playing areas also did well in the Helen Shanbrom Ace of Clubs ACBL-wide races, some of them Sanford's partners. In 2011, Gordon Deckelbaum of Hollywood won 150.10 to come second overall in the 50-100 category. In 2012, Fred Beaudin of Boynton Beach, topped the 50-100 category with 157.57. In 2013, Edward Rauch of Fort

Lauderdale won the 300-500 category with 366.76. In third place overall that year was the one and only west coast player we noticed, Paul Volpe of Fort Myers, with 188.54 points.

In 2014, Larry Lazarow of Highland

Beach was second in Sanford's 1000-2500 category with 394.17 while Kenneth Wagner Jr. of Hollywood was third with 367.42. Most recently, in last year's 1000-2500 race, Edward Rauch came in right behind Sanford with 417.10 points and David Schapira of Delray Beach was third with 356.47. There are many more highly successful club players in District 9, but these represent the ones that popped out at us when researching Sanford's wins.

If you're curious what's going on so far this year, go to ACBL.org, click on Races, and run around to your heart's content. After you satisfy your curiosity about the ACBL-wide leader board, you can always look at District 9, and even by your own unit. See page 11 for a reminder of the locations of the various units. This year, there are even more categories than before, as ACBL is posting the people who began the year with 1000-1500 masterpoints separately from the ones who started with 1500-2500. What used to be 2500-5000 is now 2500-3500 and 3500-5000.

Have fun competing in your own little corner of the masterpoint races.

If the suit adds up to 10 or more, length plus the number of honor cards (not the HCP) the suit is self sufficientt.

e.g. AKQJ32: 6 cards for length + 4 Honors = Total 10.

e.g. KQJ10652 or AQJ7432 or QJ1098532, and so on.

These are all self sufficient suits.

Count your losers.

Deductfrom 13 to calculate your tricks.

Add on the winners estimated in partner's hand. The answer is the number of tricks you are likely to make.

e.g. Opener

★ KQJ8765 ♥ K3 ♦ 2 ★ A76 = 5 losers subtract from 13 playing tricks gives you 8 playing tricks. When responder bids we expect 2 playing tricks so our 8 = their 2 = 10 tricks.

Opener Responder 1 ♠ 1NT

4 ♠ (shows a self sufficient suit)

If you have the 18/19 HCP balanced- the bid would be 2NT to show strength. Unbalanced- a jump shift in a new suit would show the strength.

This formula will also work if you have a trump fit.

the wrong card, call the Director, even if your LHO has acted. It's not too late until your partner has bid. As long as there is clear evidence that yours was a "finger error," you'll be allowed to change it. For instance, you mean to open 2♠ with your AKJ972, but 2♥ is the bidding card which hits the table. The cards are adjacent in the box and there's no question about your intentions. The slip must be of your fingers, not your mind. Of course, if you change your bid, the opponent may also want to change his.

Fumbling around in the bidding cards and then passing, or even taking a bid out of the box and then replacing it with another, is a very bad habit. Your actions constitute unauthorized information for your partner and give away information to the opponents—a lose-lose proposition. Don't be surprised if the Director is called when you do this. The opponents have every right to protect their interests.

From an ACBL Ambassador to the Far East

While being the wife of a U.S. Foreign Service Officer, I had the chance to visit many countries. The first country we visited was Hong Kong where at the first reception given in honor of our arrival, everyone came to ask me whether I played bridge. I answered "No" but then started to think about playing and sought out help in learning. It was known that King Road was where one could find all the shops where books were sold. Many bridge books were purchased by me and among them were Goren's books; I studied as much as possible and as fast as possible in order to learn and be able to play with all the people who asked me

In 1957 there was a bridge tournament at the Jewish Center in Hong Kong where I won second place, which encouraged me to keep on learning and improving in the game. Our next post was in Djakarta, Indonesia, where there was the opportunity to play with better and more experienced players and there was the opportunity to improve my game. After the post in Indonesia we went to Karachi, Pakistan. Now being a much better player, I was able to play with Nachi Hosmalali, sister of Zia, with whom my game was the best ever. At that moment I realized that teaching could be a possibility upon our return to the United States.

In 1958 we returned to the United States for a

short number of years where I took the Goren Bridge Teacher Association test and passed it. Then in 1970 there was an International European Tournament in Lido, Venice where I played against top players partnering with Pawlick Krstztof, Captain of the Polish Bridge Team. We won! One of the stories during this tournament was that I asked Pawlick and a friend to go to Catholic Mass with me, and they accepted. At the church, he took a Mass Book after Mass ended and he was told that he could not take it; but he said that if he did not take one his wife would not believe that he went to church. I played in the same tournament the following year but this time with an Italian, and we also won.

In 1969 we went back to Thailand and I started teaching bridge. Most of the people in the class were Foreign Diplomats, including the Afghan Ambassador who later on became the Afghan Prime Minister. An ACBL-sanctioned club was opened at the American Embassy in Bangkok, Thailand for Foreign Diplomats where the proceeds were given to the American Ambassador who used it to assist the poor people of the country. There was also a tryout for the Thai Team for a Far East Tournament in Shanghai, China which myself and Mrs. Poldi, from Australia, entered and ended up winning the entire tournament as first overall.

Upon our return to the United States, I taught at different places such as the World Bank, the International Monetary Fund and the Headquarters of the United States Department of Agriculture, all of which were very interesting opportunities. In 1980 we moved to Miami, Florida, where I was able to teach bridge at Miami Dade Community College for a while. Now I play as much as possible in Fort Lauderdale and Pompano and will continue to play as long as possible.

President's Message

As you have probably discerned by now, I am a voracious reader. When my husband and I are at our lake house (which was a fish camp before janitors became custodial engineers), I enjoy losing myself in mystery novels. You can imagine my delight when I learned of a newly published book – Sylvia's Bridge Mysteries. Permit me to give you a short tale.

"It was a dark and stormy night. There had been a goodly number of tables at the evening bridge game, but the players had seemed unusually restless and argumentative. As Manager, I remained to close the Club after the last patron departed. When I rounded the corner of the building on the way to my car, I found two of the Club's best players -- twin brothers Willie and Howie Cheatham -- face down on the ground with stab wounds in their backs. A "STOP" card had been placed in the hand of Willie's outstretched left arm. Howie's right hand held a pencil. I called 911, and the Police and detectives were on the scene in minutes. They spent months investigating the twin homicides, but the perpetrator(s) were never identified. A year or so later, however, whispers began circulating amongst Club members that the brothers were rumored to have been cheating. Methods included probable inappropriate use of the "STOP" card and manipulation of the pencil during bidding and play."

The moral of the story? Willie and Howie would probably be alive to this day -- perhaps not playing duplicate bridge, but still being able to see green grass beneath their feet -- if only their fellow Club members had gone through proper channels to express their suspicions. Stating that an individual cheats at bridge is a very serious allegation. As such, it must be made properly (not by saying to an individual, "you cheat") and with appropriate documentation. If you suspect someone of cheating, document your suspicions in writing with specifics as to when, where, and what you believe happened. Do this for each supposed incident. Present these written statements to your Club Disciplinary Chair, who will proceed from there. If your suspicions are incurred at a Tournament, present your written statement(s) to the Recorder for the Unit or District in which the Tournament is being held.



The following deals are all from actual play, club games, at match points. I'm confident you'll spot a common theme. With both vulnerable,





- (1) 11-14
- (2) Lead directing. Hey, we see worse bids than this every day.
- (3) After the double, promises 3+ hearts.
- (4) Competitive, NOT inviting game.
- (5) Accepting the "game invitation."

North led the •6 (the 9 was too valuable), South won the ace, capturing only the 10. South switched to a spade, but it was too late. Declarer won the ace, and discarded dummy's two spade losers on the •KQ. If South had covered dummy's 10 with the jack, she'd have lost her diamond trick, but gotten back two spade tricks in return. Down one was well above average for E/W.

We're not interested in the bidding; I think we can all agree it was not too good. The point here is that intermediate players often say, "But partner, I had to take my ace, dummy had a singleton". The sad thing is that South probably never realized that best defense would hold declarer to seven tricks. Of course that double

induced a diamond lead, ensuring at least 8 tricks for declarer. Lest you think this is a rare case, let me show you some more. With neither vulnerable,



- (1) 11-14
- (2) After overcall, 3+♠. If only 3♠, probably a max.
- (3) Control bid, in theory denying controls in clubs or diamonds.

Luckily for E/W, East got off to a ◆ lead, as a heart lead gives declarer her 12th trick. Declarer drew trumps, finishing in dummy, led a ♣ toward her hand, and West hopped up with the A. This set up three discards, which declarer used to get rid of dummy's three red suit losers.

This is the continuing theme: When the singleton is led, West MUST play low. When she played the ace, she captured declarer's ♣4. This is known as "beating air". It's true, if she had played low (actually, she should cover the ♣9 with the ten, as she must hope her partner has the ♣8; but it probably won't matter, as declarer is unlikely to let the ♣9 ride), she'd have lost her club ace. In return, she prevents declarer from taking three discards.


In fact, it is BECAUSE dummy holds a singleton that West must duck.

Watch more closely: If West covers the ♣9 with the 10, declarer will win the jack. She's still looking at a ♦ loser and a ♥ loser. She can get rid of the ♥ loser by leading the ♣K and letting it ride. Now West gets her ♣A back, and declarer still has a diamond loser. Declarer can pitch one of dummy's diamonds on the ♣Q, but cannot get

rid of both of them. Alternatively, declarer can ruff three ♣ in dummy, but must still lose a ♦ and a ♥. No matter how she wriggles, she must lose two tricks if West ducks the first club.

Let's see, play low and lose the ♣A, but win two tricks. Or, take the ♣A, and let the slam make. Seems easy to me. By the way, does it really matter if West loses her ♣A and declarer makes 13 tricks instead of 12? No, it's a bad score either way. To avoid the bad score, E/W must beat the slam, and that won't happen if West uses her ace to capture declarer's ♣K.

But wait, there's more. With N/S vulnerable,





E/W vaulted into 6♠, and North led a trump. Declarer won the trump in hand, and led a heart toward dummy. North fell from grace, rising with the ace (capturing the deuce), and now the slam could not be beaten. If North had played low, declarer would have been unable to set up enough heart tricks to discard all of her ♣ losers, and would have gone down. After North took the ♥A, declarer got two ♣ discards on the ♥KQ, a third on the fifth ♥ after the suit broke 4-3, and ruffed a ♣ in dummy.

North was worried about declarer having a singleton ♥. In fact, it is exactly that situation which makes it important for North to duck the first ♥. If declarer has a second ♥, she can return to her hand to lead another toward dummy, and since North can do nothing to prevent declarer from making both of dummy's honors, she can take her ♥A then. If declarer started with a singleton ♥, playing low holds declarer to ONE ♥

trick (plus the fifth ♥) while playing the ace gives her the ♥KQ (for two discards).

After the hand, West said it was a good thing she took her ace, since declarer turned up with a singleton, because if she'd ducked, she'd have lost it. Finally, with both vulnerable,



Declarer played the hand poorly, but as usual, the last error is the worst, and it is East's defense in which we're interested. Declarer won the lead of the heart king in dummy, drew trumps in two rounds, and cashed the ◆AK, discarding a ♣ from dummy. She then ruffed a ◆ in dummy, and led dummy's last club ... drum roll, please ... and East rose with the ace, capturing declarer's ♣4. Making six.

Look what happens if East ducks. Declarer still has two clubs and one diamond, but only one trump remaining in dummy, down one. But partner, I had to take my Ace, or I'd have lost it! Of course, if dummy had still had the second club, it would not have mattered whether East rose with the ace or not; it was the singleton that made it important for East to duck, forcing declarer to play her remaining clubs from her hand.

South can perhaps be forgiven for misplaying the hand, as she's a Flight C player with around 200 master points, but East has well over 6000 master points. After the hand was over, East said she would never duck that ace with a singleton club in dummy.

I'm sure I should finish with some sage advice, but I've lost inspiration.

It's a learning process, and helping you to continually grow "brain cells."

Marty McClain's responses: I learned in law school in 1977, and stopped around 1987 when my career took over. I returned to bridge in 2010, as something to do to get my mind off work. I am a working attorney, so the Quick Tricks evening and Saturday afternoon games are ideal for me. I have just over 200 points. My first regional was two years ago, and found it interesting enough to continue on this journey, although my primary goal is to exercise my mind. My advice is don't be discouraged by results, and care more about your mistakes than your partner's.
