#### THE JUNIOR ROAD TO JUNIOR MASTER

Katelyn Ashley (12), Elise Bedell (12) and Nathan Bedell (10) have all recently earned the ranking of Junior Master. They all started this journey in their elementary school, Bear Lake Elementary in Apopka, FL. A youth bridge club was started as an enrichment club during the school year of 2014-2015. During their weekly Friday morning meetings the kids were taught the game of bridge by their 3rd grade teacher Mrs. Anissa Dyen and by Larry and Barb Steiner (grandparents to Elise and Nathan).

They also attended Saturday classes at the Altamonte Springs Bridge Center when they could. When school is out for summer, Elise, Katelyn, Nathan and many of their bridge club friends still meet once a week to play bridge and get further instruction from Mr. and Mrs. Steiner. As Elise and Katelyn moved on to middle school, they were able to find a school sponsor, Ms. Diana Cowan, and start up a bridge club at Teague Middle School in Apopka during the 2015-2016 school year. Barb and Larry Steiner are the instructors for the Middle School Bridge Club as well. They meet once a week on Tuesday mornings.

This is their second year of the bridge club at Teague. Many kids from Bear Lake Elementary are transitioning into the club at Teague as they make their way into middle school. This year the club has welcomed a few players new to the game as well. Once Katelyn and Elise moved up

to middle school, they continued to go back to their elementary school every Friday morning (before their school starts) and volunteer their time helping teach the younger kids how to play bridge. They've done this now for a year and a half. Outside of school, the kids have played in local bridge tournaments in the Orlando area to help build up their experience and masterpoints.

Katelyn, Elise and Nathan (along with many other bridge club friends) have traveled to two Youth North American Bridge Championships, in Chicago (2015) and Washington D.C. (2016). This year they will be traveling to Toronto, ON in July for the YNABC. All three kids have placed 1st in one or more YNABC bridge sessions. With the support of the local bridge community, their schools and their families, these kids were able to achieve the status of Junior Master early in their bridge careers.

Their next bridge goals are: Katelyn wants to continue to learn more about the game of bridge and continue to help newer bridge players. She'd also like to win another first place in Toronto this summer. Elise would like to continue to grow and reach new levels as a bridge player. She also wants to continue to work with the young players who are new to the game and help them learn the basics of bridge. Nathan wants to continue to play as much as he can and have fun.

As a start, we tracked the amount of time over the course of our meetings that was devoted to strategic issues: Okay, improving our focus does not happen overnight but there is significant energy and interest in self-improvement. The next CEO deserves a competent and high performing board; our future depends on it.

Traditionally, the spring meeting is focused on the final approval of the budget for 2017 fiscal year. This year's budget provides for a slight excess in revenue over expenses and generates over 500k in cash that will help us rebuild our reserves to a more prudent level. The revenue assumptions are conservative and reflect concern over recent trends in attendance at regionals and NABCs. Most importantly, the operating budget and capital budget are aligned with our strategic priorities: Membership Growth, Technology, and our evolving focus on Volunteerism.

Two important task forces are hard at work on critical issues for our future: Tournaments and Clubs. The Tournament Task Force, chaired by Margot Hennings (D6), is focusing on turnover, I/N participation and the recent downward trend in regional attendance. The Club initiative, chaired by Kevin Lane (D23) and mirrored by a Board of Governors Club Committee, is focused on the needs of our varied types of clubs and how to strengthen their ability to attract and retain members. These task forces are collaborative models with outside experts and stakeholders to broaden our perspective and seek out innovation and "breakout" ideas. (If you are interested in either please contact the Chairs directly.)

There were a couple of interesting developments with respect to our masterpoint system. The IT department has developed a number of approaches that will allow us to lift the self-imposed moratorium on masterpoint modifications in the near future. We raised the cap on masterpoints clubs may issue from 2.5 to 4.0 thus reducing the penalty to successful clubs. Complex issues regarding the eligibility of events for Grand Life Master status are reigniting a discussion about how to rationalize our entire masterpoint structure. Stay tuned.

These are exciting times and I remain hopeful that, with the leadership of Bob Heller as our president and the commitment of the board, we can honor the mission of the ACBL: "Promote, grow, and sustain the bridge, and serve the bridge related interests of our members."

#### JUST WHEN YOU THINK YOU'VE SEEN IT ALL

When you're learning bridge, there are so many situations you've never seen before and don't know how to handle. More experienced players don't seem to have that problem. It seems impossible to ever approach their level.

Once upon a time, my team was leading a Sectional Swiss when we played the last round against a much more experienced and better player, Spike Lay from Daytona Beach. None vul, in first seat I passed, and Spike preempted 3C on a 6-card suit. This was passed back to me. With a C void and a nice 9 HCP or so, I reopened with a double. Spike and partner passed. RHO ran to another suit. After several suits were doubled, the opponents landed in 4. which I couldn't double. Partner couldn't double either and decided to bid Spike's suit because he had a nice seven-bagger. Spike doubled, we went for a number and lost the event on that board. After the event ended, when Spike and I were talking about the hand, he commented: "Just when you think you've seen it all...."

Fast forward more than 25 years and 11,000 masterpoints to the January Sectional. This time Spike was my partner when this hand came up.

How many tricks can East hand take in a Spade contract? None, right? Actually North-South can make 2♠s! Should you bid 3♥? There's no guarantee 3♥ will improve the contract, and experience suggests dropping the misfit before the doubling starts. E-W were going down 200, 300, 500 or more all over the room.

At our table, North led the ♥5 against Spike's 2♠ contract. South won the ♥Ace and returned the ♠2. Spike played the ♠3 and dummy's ♠7 won the trick! Now Spike will get a pitch or two on the ♥QJ. "Who would have believed it?" Apparently, not South ... or me. "What's going on? Does South really have all the missing Spades?"

Spike cashed the ♥QJ, and pitched two Clubs when both opponents followed. How nice: two pitches on Hearts!

Spike led a fourth Heart from dummy. South pitched a Club, Spike pitched a Diamond and North ... a Diamond! So South started with 5 Spades. There's no other explanation.

Spike led a fifth Heart from Dummy. South pitched a Club, Spike the •Q, and North ... another Diamond!

Spike led the sixth Heart from Dummy. South pitched another Club. Spike pitched the Ace of Clubs. North pitched a Club.

Spike cashed the ◆A and the ◆A, losing only the ▼A and 3♠s. Making 140. The trickless East won six tricks! Then I remembered the "just when you think you've seen it all" hand more than 25 years ago.

Nothing was said. We scored the hand and moved for the next round. During the round, the director came over and checked my private score for something. He left mumbling "It wasn't mis-scored!"

Two morals: (1) If your opponents make a mistake, be polite. Don't say anything. Just play on. We've all been there. (2) We've all made "just when you think you've seen it all" mistakes. Just keep learning.

Eventually it will be opponents, not you, who make the mistakes

## DONT

To me, it is a crime to watch the opponents open one notrump and bid unimpeded. Your opponents are great bidders after their one notrump opening. They are so expert that I'll bet they use asking bids and relays. Yes, even your lesser opponents play that 2♣ asks, and that 2♠ and 2♥ relay to the next suit. The science of bidding after a one-notrump opening is quite accurate and all of your opponents are comfortable with the methods.

They are not comfortable, however, with interference. Not only do you take away their Stayman and Jacoby, but you put them into uncomfortable territory. Even experts with well-oiled mechanisms (lebensohl, negative doubles) have a difficult time coping with interference. If your partner opened one notrump (15-17) and you held, say,

- ♣ K92

your plan would be easy. You'd transfer to two hearts and then invite with two notrump.

But, if RHO overcalled one notrump with two spades, would you be happy? What if the overcall was two diamonds, showing diamonds and a major? What would your bids mean? Can you play from the right side? What would you bid?

It's quite obvious how the interference makes notrump auctions a challenge. Given that, we should go out of our way (way out!) to interfere. Don't worry about "having your values" -- your goal is just to disturb, it's not to convey your hand to partner so that he can bid a game or double them.

I recommend the same methods in direct or balancing seat. In balancing seat (after 1NT PP...), I can't stand to pass. I go out of my way to balance with almost any hand that contains a 6+ card suit, or at least 5-4 in any 2 suits. HCP don't matter (what you don't have, your partner will). I don't like to defend 1NT (with partner usually leading the suit I don't want led).

Once you decide to interfere, I feel strongly that the best method is DONT. There are many methods to choose from (so many, that you can start an alphabet song such as: A is for ASTRO, B is for BROZEL, C is for CAPPELLETTI, D is for DONT...).

DONT allows you to show all oneand two-suiters at the two level. Your goal should be safety. The other methods put more emphasis on penalty doubles, and on getting to majors. Furthermore, DONT is very easy to memorize (very natural).

#### DONT

Opponents open strong 1NT:

In direct or balancing seat our bids mean:

Double = One-suited hand (requests 2♣ from partner)

2 = 2 suits, + higher

 $2 \blacklozenge = 2 \text{ suits}, \blacklozenge + \text{ higher}$ 

2 = 2 suits, + higher

2♠ = Natural

(Against weak notrumps, I recommend some other system that employs double to show a good hand.)

Penalty doubles of strong notrumps are, in my opinion, horrible. Yes, horrible. It makes it easy for them to run out (often to two-of-a-minor, normally unreachable), and when they do sit, it's usually "impossible" to make an opening lead and defend (declarer's advantage).

Getting to the higher-scoring major is also not my priority; again, it's a matter of

percentages. In the long run it's better to get all one- and two-suiters into play and not worry about how big your plus score is; the focus is on how low your minus score is! Get in, get out, and you'll be a winner.

Notes:

Usually we try to have at least 5-4 in the 2 suits -- vulnerability is relevant, as is "position". (Direct seat is "never" 4-4.)

When vulnerable, you must have decent suits (not Qxxx and Jxxxx!).

Don't worry about game! Balance with "few HCP" but with shape!

After our Double: Partner "always" removes to 2♣. If the doubler now converts to 2♠ he is showing more than a simple 2♠ overcall. [Example: 1NT X P 2♠; P 2♠]

After our 2♣ overcall: Partner should pass with 3+♣. With a doubleton club, partner will usually bid 2♦ to play in overcaller's other suit. [Example: 1NT 2♣ P -- Pass with 3♣, otherwise remove to 2♦]

**After our 2♦ overcall:** Partner should pass with 3+ ♦ unless he has both majors.

After our 2 vovercall: With equal length in the majors, partner can pass or hog the hand if he wishes. The most sensible idea is to pick the suit/side so that the strong hand (1NT opener) will be on lead.

What if we make a DONT overcall and their responder doubles? For example: 1NT 2♣ X ??

In this case, the partner of the DONT bidder does as follows:

PASS = Willing to play in that suit (in the example auction, clubs).

REDOUBLE = Not willing to play in that suit (asks partner to remove to his other suit)

NEW SUIT = Natural--not asking for pass/correct

I advise only advanced players to bother memorizing the following (and even they probably should consider this not worth the memory strain as it "never" comes up:)

After all of the DONT overcalls, 2NT (by

"advancer") shows game interest and asks for more information.

A 24 overcaller then bids 34 with a minimum, his other suit with a maximum.

A 2♦ overcaller bids:

3♣=minimum with equal length or longer diamonds

3♦=minimum with longer major--after which 3M=pass/correct

3♥=maximum with hearts

3♠=maximum with spades

A 2♥ overcaller bids:

3♣=minimum with longer hearts or equal length in the majors

3♦=minimum with longer spades

3♥=maximum with longer hearts or equal length in the majors

3♠=maximum with longer spades
All actions discussed above are alertable.

Shirley: This was Board 12 from the CommonGame, Tuesday 12/28/16. West dealt with NS vulnerable Can you find any errors in bidding, play, or defense?

South led the ♦8, and North won the ♦Q, the ♦A, and played a third ♦, ruffed by South with the ♥3. Next South led the ♠A, followed by the ♣Q, both winning. The defense won the first five tricks, but East ruffed the next ♣, played the ♥A and when North showed out, finessed the ♥J, played the ♥K and claimed the rest (1♠, 5♥s, 1♠, 1♠ ruff) for -110 NS. This was worth 9% in the CommonGame for NS based on 877 times played.

#### **Solution:**

Bidding: With 13 HCP, it is incorrect for West to pass, and so 1♣ is 100% correct. I also agree with the next four calls. But North made a major error by passing 2♥. I prefer 2♠

which is actually lead-inhibiting, given North failed to immediately overcall 1♠. Double is also acceptable. Either call is likely to lead NS to play 2♠ or 3♠. With proper play, this should lead to +170 NS for a 70% score (a 61% improvement over the actual result).

#### **Defense and Play:**

East played perfectly. After the ruff, the only problem occurs if all three remaining trump were in one hand. If North has the three, nothing can be done. So she led her \(\nstar{A}\) first. Had she carelessly crossed to the ♥K on the first round of trump, she goes down one. South error: South was asleep at the switch. On the third ♦, South should ruff with the ♥10. Then South should play the ♠A and the ♠9 to put declarer in dummy. This creates a two-way finessing position. Now declarer will worry the ♥-10 was a singleton (the only holding that appears to be problematic), and so she would lead the ♥K from dummy. If South shows out on the **V**K, she picks up the **V**Q on a marked finesse. Declarer, a strong player, is most unlikely to credit South with this deceptive play. But even if NS had scored +50 instead of -110, their matchpoint score would have improved from 9% to just 17%.

#### Lessons:

(1) North failed to "pre-balance" over 2, where without action the opponents are likely to be in their comfort zone. There is almost no way that South can balance. (2) The late Sam Gold, Canadian Bridge Hall of Famer and amazing mentor, pointed out to his students that clever discarding can create a potential two-way finesse when only a successful one-way finesse existed before your discard. Keep this in the back of your mind.



I opened a slightly light notrump. Partner raised to 3N. South found himself in a fix. He took only one bid and when East came again with 5•, South let it go and so did North. This was a bit of last board syndrome, when players are rushing to get the scores.

5♦ undoubled went down 4 for 200 to N/S. Our team gained 15 imps to win the match by 8 imps.

After this run of good fortune, our team went on to win the final. It seemed written.

# Daisy Don't Play DONT?

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Most everyone at the club knows that Daisy is my favorite bridge student/partner. One reason for my high regard for Daisy is her readiness to take on new challenges in life, particularly at the bridge table. Her courage is evident in her willingness to adopt new bridge conventions that might improve her game.

I usually don't encourage my students to play complicated bidding conventions and treatments that might be misused or forgotten in the heat of battle. (The sad memories of licking painful wounds still haunt me at times.) But with Daisy, I am quite willing to endure the occasional consequences of her misapplying a newly-learned approach. With her commitment to the game, she invariably applies herself to memorizing, if not mastering such new methods.

With all this in mind, I had mixed feelings when Daisy entered the bridge club the other day with a Starbucks double latte in hand and a mischievous smile on her face. The presence of her caffeinated drink was a promising sign as Daisy invariably plays her best bridge when under the influence. Any favorable benefits suggested by her impish smile was another matter. Only time would tell.

Seating herself next to me, she boldly stated that it was high time that our partnership employ a more sophisticated method when competing against the opponents' strong 1NT opening bid. Previously we had been playing a simple and natural method of only bidding a long suit, provided the hand was appropriate in other respects. Such an approach is essentially limited to describing hands that contain one long suit. That's only four opportunities to enter the auction. That is certainly better than none but not nearly as effective as a system that provides a means of bidding with two-suited hands, as well as all

one-suited hands

There are numerous means of competing with shapely hands after an opponent opens 1NT. For reasons of simplicity and overall effectiveness, I prefer Marty Bergen's conventional method. It is commonly known by the acronym DONT, which stands for **D**isturb the **O**pponents' **N**o **T**rump. In addition to enhancing your ability to describe shapely hands, it also improves your ability to do as its name suggests – disturb the opponents' bidding when they open one notrump.

Appreciating the challenge of both memorizing and applying new material, I asked Daisy if she felt completely comfortable with the various nuances of the convention. With a troubled look on her face she sheepishly replied, "Well, I've been studying it for what seems like forever," then took a big swig of her latte. Suddenly invigorated with a burst of new-found courage, she confidently responded, "Hey, when was I ever completely comfortable with anything in life?"

Now armed with a new piece of bidding weaponry in our arsenal, we moved to our designated table to start the game. Karma seemed to be in full play as the Bridge Gods conspired to put Daisy's mastery of the DONT Convention to the test on our very first board. Her RHO opened 1NT, which was announced as 15 to 17 HCP. Holding **♠**AKQ1086, **♥**872, **♦**93, **♣**42, Daisy paused to consider what action she might take. When specifically holding a long spade suit, DONT allows you to distinguish between weak, moderate and strong hands. (Holding a hand with extra length but light on values, such as ♠KQ108642, ♥872, ♦3, ♣42, one could jump to 3♠. Holding a hand with exceptional strength, such as ♠AKQ1086, ♥KQ2, ♦93, ♣42, one would first double, then bid some number of spades. With a hand of moderate values, such as the one Daisy held, one could immediately overcall 2♠.)

Struggling recall the various to possibilities that were available to describe her present holding, Daisy anxiously reached for her Starbucks. In her distracted state, she accidently knocked her cup over, spilling its contents. Flustered, she grabbed several napkins and began mopping-up her latte, then withdrew the pass card from her bidding box and placed it on the table. Her LHO briefly considered the situation before bidding 3NT. Three passes followed, placing Daisy on lead with a relatively easy choice.

This was the full deal:

▼ AQ54

♦ AQ76

♣ A73

Before Daisy even finished cashing her six spade tricks, declarer faced his remaining cards and claimed, "down two." North commented, "I guess four hearts makes, with an overtrick." South, a wise and understanding partner, responded, "I certainly don't blame you for your 3NT call. I would have made the same bid with your flat, 13 count." North then noted, "I would have searched for a safer contract if there had been any bidding from the opponents." South added, "After a spade bid by Daisy, either cue-bid Stayman or a penalty double would have worked out better." North lamented, "It's a shame she didn't bid."

There was an awkward silence as it gradually dawned upon both opponents that Daisy's first-round pass was somewhat pusillanimous (I believe that is Latin for

spineless). While trying not to appear spiteful, South innocently asked Daisy why she passed with her excellent spade suit. Mildly embarrassed, and now lacking her usual caffeinated support, Daisy stammered and stuttered for a few moments, then shyly admitted that she forgot how she might show her hand.

North examined our convention card and commented to his partner, "It says here that they play DONT, as in, disturb the opponents' notrump." South quipped, "From my point of view, Daisy's failure to bid was the most disturbing aspect of the entire hand."

I interjected, "It is true that we just recently agreed to use the DONT Convention." I then added, "Daisy evidently decided to go rogue and introduce her own convention... WONT." Both opponents looked baffled and I continued, " $\underline{\mathbf{W}}$ imp out over the  $\underline{\mathbf{\Omega}}$ pponents  $\underline{\mathbf{N}}$ o  $\underline{\mathbf{T}}$ rump."

While licking her latte cup clean of its now scant remains, Daisy absent-mindedly nodded her head in agreement with my absurd explanation, making it quite clear that an immediate caffeine refill was in order.

(Note: Many experienced players have come to appreciate the benefit of "sandbagging" a pass when holding a rock-solid long suit after their RHO opens 1NT. As in the hand discussed here, the player with the long and strong suit frequently ends up on opening lead against a notrump contract, spelling instant disaster for the unsuspecting declarer.)

# Play Hard, Play Well: Desperation

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Desperation is the Father of Invention.

Playing in a National Pairs Championship against a pair of world champions, you have the following bidding mix up, which leads to a difficult 3NT contract.

Non-Vulnerable, you pick up (deal rotated):

- **★** K 1063
- ♥AJ1085
- **♦** A
- ♣ A.J.5

You	RHO	Partner	LHO
1♥	Pass	1NT	Pass
2♠	Pass	3♣	Pass
3♦	Dbl	3NT	All Pass

Now putting yourself in partner's seat, dummy hits and you see:

- **★** K 1063
- ♥AJ1085
- A
- ♣AJ5
- **♦**Q74
- **♥** K 7
- **♦** O 3
- ♣ Q108632

3NT is not as easy of a contract as 5♣, but this is where you are. LHO leads a low ♦. Play the play!

If the  $\bigstar K$  is onside and the suit is 2-2 or the  $\bigstar K$  is a singleton, meaning the opponents cannot duck and block the suit, then we have  $6 \bigstar$ ,  $1 \spadesuit$ , and  $2 \blacktriangledown$  tricks. But it looks like that to make a lead-directing double, RHO has more than just the  $\bigstar K$ , including probably one or both of the  $\bigstar A$  and  $\bigstar K$ . Given that, it seems that the  $\bigstar$  suit is unlikely to come in or to have a favorable lie.

Instead of playing for a legitimate make, we remember that we are playing against thoughtful players playing matchpoints. It seems from the opening lead that the ◆ suit is 5-5, but RHO does not know that, so they may think that we have 4◆ and LHO may have 3◆, as it seems reasonable that we had Qxxx instead of Qx for bidding 3NT. If we take a simple ♣ finesse (leading the ♣10 or leading to the ♣J), RHO will be forced to just return a ◆ and take their tricks

- 1: •6 A 2 3 (+1) 2: •5 2 K 4 (+2)
- 3: ♣Q 4 5 K (-1)

Leading the ♣Q has blocked the ♣ suit. With this suit blocked, now RHO has a losing option. If they believe that we have ♦QJx left then they may not want to cash the ♦K, giving us more tricks. And this is exactly what happened!

- 4: **♥**6 7 Q A (+3) 5: **♥**J **♥**3 **♣**2 **♦**4 (+4)
- 6: **♥**10 **♥**9 **♣**3 **♣**9 (+5)
- 7: **♥**8 **♦**5 **♣**6 **♦**8(+6)

Unfortunately, even having accomplished this trickery, we only have 5♥, 1♦, and 2♣, which is still only 8 tricks. But in a continuation of the ruse that you have ♦QJx left, you convince the opponents to discard their ♦ as you cash these winners.

Now that the opponents have discarded enough ◆, you can knock out the ◆A and claim your 9 tricks.

Sometimes desperate times call for desperate measures. When you are confident the cards do

## Help Us Help Yourself

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Most of us play in a lot more pair games than team games. With the advent of electronic scoring, it's gotten pretty easy for players and directors. There's an occasional score correction, but the process is familiar and comfortable. While many clubs will print game summaries for the checking of scores, we don't do that at tournaments.

Instead, we print a recap sheet for each section which shows all the scores for every pair. In addition, ACBL Live provides an almost instant copy of your scores. If you haven't yet signed up to have scores sent to your e-mail, it's easy to enroll. Just go to Live.ACBL.org to sign up. It's free to any ACBL member. Even with all this instant information and ease of correction, any Director-in-Charge (DIC) of a tournament can tell you that there will be late corrections. Don't forget, a change in your favor will require the corroboration of your opponents. You can find out who they were from Live or from the recap sheet.

Matters aren't so simple with team play. Something you may not know which may make your life more pleasant in a Knock-Out: That team number you got when you bought your entry is only useful to you or the directors until the bracket placements have been assigned and the bracket wall sheets displayed.

You may have been the 18th team to buy an entry, but now you're in Bracket Three, and your team will be known for the rest of the event by the team member's name which is printed on the sheet. Regardless of who you think the captain of your team should be, the name which will be used is the first one on the entry sheet. It astonishes me that many players have no

idea who's captain. That should be pretty easy to remember, even if you've just met at the Partnership Desk.

While you are waiting to get your KO assignment, have a quick look around the area so you know where the various sections are. Then listen to the announcements so you'll know whether you're in a head-tohead match or a three-way match. When there are a lot of sections, the directors will probably also put up a sign showing which sections are paired for head-toheads and which are used for three-ways. It helps a lot if only one person from each team is up front for the assignments and announcements, easing congestion and noise. Keep track of your entry slip, making sure all members of your team are included. This is especially important if there are more than four players on your team. Write your original table assignment on the entry so the caddy doesn't have to do this chore while picking up entries. Then, please don't hide the entry! It's a good idea to leave it at your original table if possible.

If you are in a Round Robin -- or three way -- match, pay attention to the instructions. If you forget, call a director right away for guidance. Don't ask the caddies to move RR boards: that's your job unless the director has said otherwise. The East-West pair takes the boards they've just played to their home table before moving on to the third table in the RR.

There are fewer three way matches in Swiss Team events, though if there is an uneven number of teams, an RR will be necessary. Three way matches move the same way in Swiss as in KOs, though the scoring is different. In KOs, if each of the three teams wins a match, only two will Please see page 31

#### POINT-COUNTERPOINT: SEMI-FORCING 1NT

In the March-April issue of the SBN (pages 35-36) Dar Webb advances the idea of a semi-forcing 1NT to partner's opening 1♥ or 1♠ opener. As the author noted, this is common when the 1NT responder is a passed hand, but is unusual in most partnerships when the 1♥ or 1♠ opener is in first or second position. While some of the reasons why this novel strategy can work well are cited in the article, there were no balancing comments on harms that could occur by losing the forcing nature of 1NT. This point-counterpoint assessment will explore the gains and losses of the two strategies (semi-forcing vs. forcing 1NT) when partner opens 1♥ or 1♠ in first or second seat

Gains for Semi-Forcing 1NT: (1) Ability to play in 1NT when opener has 5-3-3-2 shape and 12-13 HCP. (2) Avoidance of awkward bidding when opener has 4♣-5♥-2♠-2♣. (3) Not mentioned, but responder can bid 1NT with a good 11 to a bad 12 HCP without the worry of missing a game. With a forcing NT, you could end up in a tenuous 2NT contract instead of a comfortable 1NT. Opener only passes 1NT with a minimum balanced hand.

#### **NOTICE**

From the ACBL Handbook of Rules and Regulations
Whenever a sectional (excluding STaCs) or higher rated event is being conducted within 25 miles of a club game's playing site, the club is permitted to hold only its regularly scheduled club masterpoint games (i.e., no special games).

Gains for a Forcing 1NT: (1) You can bid a forcing 1NT in response to 1♥ or 1♠ with an opening bid that has fewer than three card support and no five-card side suit. Thus a 2/1 in a minor(game force) either has a 5+ card suit or 3+ card support for the major. This makes further bidding simpler when 2/1 does occur. (2) It is controversial as to whether you are better off in 1NT or two of the major when you have two card support. My partnerships have done well in these major suit contracts. Over 1M-1NT, then 2♣ or 2♦, you will put partner back in the major with a doubleton support unless there is a three card differential in the lengths of partner's suits. But when you have a singleton in partner's suit, and only three cards in the minor, you should be happy to bid a 5-card red suit over 2♣ or 2♠. (3) You may lose the ability to play in three of a minor with a six-card suit or 3♥ holding six ♥ when partner opens 1♠. Most play Bergen today, and 2/1 is a game force. So there is no natural weak jump shift available. (4) An important liability, especially at matchpoints, is that the 1NT responder should be terrified of bidding a semi-forcing 1NT with limit raise strength and three card support. In general, NT will play one to three tricks worse than the suit. This is especially problematic at matchpoints.

One note of importance: If the bidding goes 1M(P)1NT(P);P opener's pass need not be alerted, but if asked, responder must fully disclose what the strength and distribution are. If the opponents balance and the opener winds up in two of the major, the defense can be almost double dummy in terms of opener's strength and shape, a big advantage to the defense over the corresponding forcing NT auction. If you are a defender, be sure to ask exactly what a pass of a semi-forcing 1NT call implies. The 1NT response is of course announced as "semi-forcing".

So in short, a Semi-Forcing 1NT response opposite a first or second seat major opener is a mix of advantages and disadvantages. Your choice should be a partnership one with knowledge of what it gains and what it loses.

# TENTH ANNUAL ZEKE JABBOUR "PLAY WITH THE STARS" EVENT IS HUGE SUCCESS

On January 29th, 2017, the Tenth Annual "Play with the Stars" Bridge Luncheon in honor of Zeke Jabbour was held at the St Andrews Country Club in Boca Raton. The charity event is dedicated to raising money in support of those afflicted with Parkinson's Disease.

Play with the Stars features the opportunity for patrons to play a session of bridge with many of the top professionals in the game today. In this year's event 35 bridge stars volunteered their time in support of the event. Said Eric Rodwell, sponsored by event underwriter the Mary Jane Harlow Charitable Trust: "Zeke helped all of us improve our game and more importantly he [is] a consummate gentleman who set a high standard for professional conduct"

While Zeke is still very chipper and can be seen hard-walking his Boca Raton neighborhood each morning, he is passing his honoree mantle on. The event started in 2007 when Zeke walked into the local chapter of the National Parkinson foundation and said, "How can I help?" Zeke has benefited from the services and support offered by the local chapter and gives back what he can.

This year's event included 38 tables of bridge which director Linda Green ran

smoothly despite the usual last minute changes. Alan Osofsky won the event playing with Jenny Wolpert with a 68% game. Gary Cohler, second with event chairperson yours truly, said "Zeke has always had an uncanny grasp of 'What's Goin' On', but he is so nice about it you don't mind losing to him."

One convention Zeke recommends is the Size Ask. After a 1 NT opener, responder bids 2 to inquire if opener has a minimum or a maximum. The bid is used when responder has either an invitational hand or long clubs. It avoids the need for responder to go through 2 when playing 4-way transfers and thus blocks a disruptive overcall by the opponents. It is typical of Zeke's convention card, which is well thought out to work both offensively and defensively.

Zeke's many accomplishments include amassing over 32,000 master points, national and international titles and winning the Barry Crane Top 500. District 9's annual Sportsmanship Award is named after Zeke who presented it last year to Jeff Meckstroth. The game has greatly progressed from the point where less experienced players were intimidated by overly intense professionals. Sportsmanship is one of Zeke's significant contributions to the game.



not lie where you need them to be to make the contract, then look for another way to convince the opponents to do something to help you.

The complete deal was the following:



advance. The team who has the greatest negative balance, comparing the two matches, will get credit for half a win, but still does not continue in the event. Want to know what you've earned? Look all the way at the bottom of the bracket sheet and you will see the masterpoint chart for your bracket. Of course, in Swiss teams, no one is eliminated: all three will continue in the event. It's important to remember that you've played two different opponents and to turn in separate scores for each win. Losers don't have to turn in results. The winning team should confirm the outcome with their opponents and get the result in as soon as possible. Often, the matching software on the computer is stymied waiting for just one or two results.

Unfortunately, most of the time when we make announcements, not many players listen. We'll tell you how many boards per round and how many rounds (on Sunday usually six rounds these days with eight boards in the open and seven in the limited). We'll show you the clock for your group. It's likely to be set with the total time to play your hands, compare with your team and turn in the results.

As well, we'll tell you what Victory Point scale we're using. Unit 128 uses the 30 point scale, but some of the other Florida units use the 20 point scale. If you miss this information, you can figure it out for yourself when you see the first results posted. Add together the scores shown for teams one and two: they played each other on the first round.

Bridge players and bridge directors are fallible. Erroneous scores are turned in, the wrong key can be hit on a keyboard. You have to help us -- and yourself -- by knowing what your score should have been and checking it on the chart. In the scoring program there's a "worksheet" for each team, so we can easily check what was posted. If there's an error, it can be corrected. It's your responsibility to confirm that your score was entered correctly.

#### QUALIFYING AT YOUR CLUB WILL BEGIN SOON

In the months of June, July and August, your local bridge club will be holding qualifying games for the North American Pairs. After you qualify at a club game, you and any other qualified player of District 9 will have the opportunity to play in the District 9 Finals on October 28th and 29th. The top three or four pairs in the district events will earn the right to represent District 9 in the finals of the event to be held in Philadelphia, in March of 2018. Not only do you get to represent us, you get a financial subsidy to do it!

Even we Juniors are getting old. The first time I wrote for the SBN regarding the GNT, I was entering college. Now, I'm a college graduate and a member of the workforce. Time flies when you're having fun, doesn't it?

With the NAP qualifiers looming back in August, I was at a crossroads regarding who to play with. I've felt like my game has improved significantly in the past year or so and I knew I was in a position to do very well with the right partner. I reached out to the better players at the Clearwater Duplicate Bridge Center (my home club) and asked if they knew any strong B players who would be a great partner for me. A name that a lot of people mentioned was none other than Unit 128 Vice-President and allaround awesome guy Jeff Edelstein. I knew who he was but had never really talked to him before. I sent him an email, we talked on the phone a few times, and before you know it, we were a new partnership trying to win NAP B for Florida.

Jeff and I had only played twice before our state qualifier in late October. He's got a big list of partners for his games over at Tampa and I can only play on the weekends due to work. Initially, I was fearful that this wouldn't work out. Boy, was I wrong. Despite little partnership experience, Jeff and I have always been on very similar wavelengths with regards to our bidding. Here's an example hand from the qualifiers:



Jeff did a great job of not burying me by bidding 3♣ over 2♠. He decided to introduce a fragment 3-card ♠ suit which I was more than happy to pass despite being in a Moysian. Our +140 was nearly a top.

We finished the qualifiers in 1st by a slim margin, with games of 60% and 63%. Next came the most important part: getting more practice in for the NABC. Jeff and I started practicing at least once a month and played local sectionals/regionals whenever they were available. We were dominating them. Three times in four games, we cracked 65% in a sectional open game. Not only was I confident that we'd compete, I was confident that we'd be able to win the whole thing.


Soon enough, it was time for the NABC and Jeff and I were on our way to Kansas City, MO. We arrived a few days early to practice, including playing in the 0-10K Swiss with local partner and good friend Sally Meckstroth. While the team kept going up and down to finish 12th (Bill Gates ended up winning), Jeff and I were playing amazing as a partnership. Finally, it came time for the event.

Our first session started off well, with an upper-57% game that was good enough to put us at 12th overall in the field of 97. The evening session was good too for a similar percent, even with a misunderstanding that got us to a whopping 24 instead of 47, which makes 7 on Deep Finesse play (don't ask for that auction). That put us in 5th overall, with the 52 left who qualified to the second day.

We knew we could win if we delivered two similar sessions on the second day. Right out of the gate, that was in jeopardy, as for the first time in months, a trick was dropped on defense here or there. Here's a highlight board:

We luckily rightsided the hand and didn't get a ♥ lead, so I was able to make 6 by setting up the 13th ♦. This involved creating 5 entries to my hand, so I scored the AK of ♣ and Q54 of ♠ to set it up. Good job with fortunate conventional bidding to score more MPs.

In the end, we finished the afternoon session at 52%, which was good enough to not drop us far. At 7th place, we were about a board and a half behind the leaders. In retrospect, I think Jeff and I played too tight in this session. We weren't just having fun and going with it like we were before. That's what we agreed to do in the final session to try to come back. Turns out that was our best session of them all – 58% and would have been higher minus system fixes by the opponents. We climbed up to 4th but couldn't catch the leaders, who stitched together two big games to take the title.

Regardless of the result, I had a great time playing with Jeff. He won't be able to play in B next year because he'll be past 2500 by then (I still have a few more years before that'll happen), but we will continue being a partnership going forward. Our next goal is GNT for Florida. Wish us luck!

# PLAYING IN THE PRESIDENT'S CUP IN KANSAS CITY

When the score at our local club, the Tampa Bay Bridge Club, said qualifying in A, B and C, we had no idea what it meant. Fred Tanzer, the director, explained that we had qualified to play the following month in the district finals for the North American Pairs, formerly known as the Grand National Pairs.

So, with less than 300 points between us and having no expectation whatsoever of qualifying, we set off to St. Petersburg for the district qualifiers. We were shocked to come in 3rd place in the state in C. The North American Pairs for C event is also known as the President's Cup. We had no intention to go to Kansas City until we were informed that District 9 would pay \$500 each toward our expenses. How could we say no to that?

In the months leading up to the Spring NABC, we received so much encouragement from the members of our club! This included not only good wishes but a lot of good advice. The best advice, we thought, was from our District VP, Jeff Edelstein, who said, Don't bid yourselves into a zero. Words to live by!

The experience of attending the Spring NABC was overwhelmingly positive. The hotels were beautiful, the food was great, the bridge was extremely competitive and the officiating was stellar.

We played Saturday, our first day there, in a gold rush game where we were able to win some red, and on Tuesday we were able to land some gold. But the highlight was The President's Cup on Sunday and Monday.

Sunday was the qualification round for The President's Cup. There were 89 pairs from all over the country and Canada, from San Diego to Montreal. The competition was the most rigorous either of us had ever experienced. All

ages were represented, from those in their late teens or early twenties who were embarking on their bridge career to older folks like us who had rejoined the duplicate bridge world upon our retirement. The young players appeared to us to be the future rising stars of bridge.

We knew that only 52 of the 89 would qualify. At this point, with under 200 points each, we did not expect to qualify for the second day, especially after a not so strong close in the first session. This allowed Marty to relax a bit and play somewhat better bridge in the evening session. We just enjoyed the competition and the people we met, truly enjoying the experience. We left the room after the second session, sure that we would not qualify. We were stunned and extremely excited when Jeff called to tell us that we had squeaked by and come in at #52!

Bidding was highly competitive and the players interfered whenever they could. It was rare that we were allowed to play a 24 or 27 contract. One pair found a slam using Exclusion Blackwood, a convention we had not

encountered before. When a young pair from Texas was bidding using an XYZ convention, they were very nice about explaining their bidding, since we had no idea what their bids meant.

In the end, we climbed up another eleven spots and ended up in 41st position, which we felt was quite an accomplishment given the number of points we had going in and the handicap of starting in last place. There was considerable turnover during the finals.

The pair from Montreal who won a session during the qualifying round fell apart during the finals. The young pair from the Detroit area climbed considerably to take first place. We met people from all over North America and were even invited to play Swiss Teams with a pair from New Hampshire who placed much higher than we.

All in all, we had one of the most challenging bridge experiences of our lives and neither of us regret playing in the President's cup for a minute. We would like to thank District 9 for their support and this honor. And we would very strongly encourage players of all levels to try to qualify for the North American Pairs next time the qualifying rounds come along. We sure plan to try again!

Editor's Note: We hope you have enjoyed hearing the excitement in the voices of these players who reached the finals of their flights. Remember to qualify at your local clubs in June, July or August.

Flight A is unlimited, Flight B is for players who have fewer than 2500 masterpoints in the count generated on May 6th. Flight C is for non-life masters who have fewer than 500 masterpoints in the count generated on May 6th.

These requirements are actually subject to change, as ACBL has not yet published its 2017-2018 conditions of contest for this event. By June 1st, we expect the rules to be finalized. Line up your partners now!

After every regional tournament hosted by Unit 128, your Board asks for your feedback about your tournament experience. There are some myths out there, so let me try to address some recurring complaints:

## "Why cant there be larger/ better tables?"

The truth is no one is selling a portable card table less than 34". Some of our tables are 30" square. These tables allow us to fit the tournament into the hotel space that there is available to us to rent. Think of it this way: If we were to throw out all the old tables and buy all new ones, we would lose one square foot of playing space for every 3 tables! Currently at most sites, we rent, from the hotels, all available space, over 10,000 square feet per tournament. If it was as easy as renting more space, we would have done that long ago. Karl Miller has resurfaced many of the smaller tables, and a couple of years ago, we were able to purchase, and did replace, over 150 tables. While many of you are used to tables that may be larger, at your local club, those tables don't travel the entire state, week after week, month after month, so they can be larger, and better made than ones that are 30". Currently we are looking to join with another district to explore the possibility of having tables made to specifications. The last time we did that, to be quite honest, it was a disaster. So once burned twice shy. We promise that we are looking for solutions. As they occur, we promise to keep you informed.

## "Why are the cards so dirty or worn?

The simple answer - Bridge players and dirty hands. The Unit owns about 75 sets of bridge boards. About half are the old fashioned metal boards (which aren't made anymore) and the others are the newer plastic boards which allow for easier duplication of hands by a dealing machine. Many are accustomed to the old style and liked the way the vulnerability

was marked on those boards. We are looking to find a company or service organization that we can hire to refurbish all the boards and either repaint or put new vulnerability labels in the boards. If any of you know of a service organization that would like to earn some money fixing up our boards, please contact any Board member. While all the cards are replaced at regular intervals (37 sets were replaced just last month), the directors are willing, to switch out any that you deem need replacing. Just call the DIRECTOR, while you are playing a hand that you think needs replacement. In the last four years, only about a dozen of you have taken the time to call to switch out the cards.... Please help us to help you!

## "The room is always too hot or too cold!"


While each of us likes the temperature we like, we suggest that each person bring with them something warm that can be removed, if you feel too warm. Most hotels have the thermostats set at a certain temperature. We have it in our contracts with the hotels, to try to insure the most comfortable playing conditions. When you bring a group of folks together it raises the temperature in the room, the thermostats kick on, and any pairs sitting near or underneath the air ducts will feel cold. And while we do pass your comments on to the hotel, it is darn near impossible to keep the room temperature at everyone's liking.

I welcome any questions you may have, and will do my best to see that you receive a reply. If we can fix it we will, but I believe you cannot please every bridge player. (We do try nonetheless).

# Bridge in the Panhandle

Our esteemed editor asked me to write a little something about mv towards iournev Life Master, a goal I recently achieved at the January Sandestin Regional. was somehow fitting that I received the LAST five of fifty Gold points I



needed at our Unit's only Regional: after all, I received my FIRST five Gold points at the first Sandestin Regional, in 2013. How's that for bridge-v bookends?!!

I started playing party bridge when I was fifteen, in the school library, with some fellow members of the math team. I will always remember the first time I said, "Double." We were all beginners, and my LHO, holding AKOJ of Hearts, had bid Four Hearts. I held a Yarborough (not even a jack), but I was also holding the 2,3,4,5,6,7,8,9 and 10 of Hearts.... The Okinawans have a proverb which advises. "Kind Hearts are Better Than Fair Faces." It was my understanding on that particular day that "Nine Hearts are Better Than Fair Face Cards..."

I discovered that bridge-playing was a useful skill while I was in college at Davidson when women were still scarce. It was particularly helpful to me when there was an awkward mix-up with dates. What was I to do when THREE guys showed up at the same time? I tried two-on-two volleyball, but that got a little heated. So we ended up PLAYING BRIDGE. Whew!!

I managed to play bridge for almost forty years (years that included Graduate School in Biology, working in a Cytogenetics Lab, raising three children and caring for parents), during which time no one told me about Duplicate Bridge. I was given hints along the way, though. My Uncle Bill told me that his wife, my Aunt Nell, was a "Grand Life Master." I never questioned this statement, because she really was kinda bossy... Twenty years later, that dear woman bequeathed to me two heavy hinged boxes filled with 4-slotted steel trays loaded with Kem cards. No explanation was

given to me other than "She knew you liked to play bridge." I thought those "trays" were so weird. The boxes went under the bed.

Another hint came years later, while playing in a weekly game. There was a woman there who had chronic laryngitis, making it difficult for her to speak. I was amazed at her cleverness: she had a red box which she put on the table, and from that box she could put any bid on the table from PASS to XX, from 1 Club to 7 No Trump!

Finally, I was invited to fill in at a bridge game at someone's home in Pensacola. They explained the mechanics of Duplicate Bridge, and I saw the same kind of metal trays my aunt had left to me. My new friends introduced me to Weak Two Bids and Transfers. I played with a woman named Irene, and we somehow came in first with a score of 32 out of a possible 50. One bridge game played duplicate-style and I was hooked.

Two years later, on a Tuesday afternoon at the end of April, I knocked on the door of the Pensacola Duplicate Bridge Club. I played that night, came in "First in B," whatever that was, and that hook dug in deeper. Despite my late start, I received the Ace of Clubs for the 0-5 category that first year. The Okinawans have another proverb: "You Will Become a Master by Constant Practice." For all of you still working towards achieving Life Master status, you should know that "You Will Become a Life Master by Constant Practice."

Several players in our Unit have practiced well enough to obtain notable changes in

rank. Linda R. Zdenek of Shalimar is a new Life Master. I hope to have some tidbits of her story, and Lena Allen's. Beth McArthur soon! also made life Master, at the Pensacola Sectional in March. Bronze was achieved by Ron M. Deluca (Destin) and


